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#### **De-Snaring Report for July, 2011**

#### **Monthly Summary**

The Team has experienced a rise in the illegal human activities inside the park. At Umbi area there is very serious logging at night by use of moonlight. There are a lot of bicycle tracks moving in and out of the park, ferrying illegal goods to the market.

At Kanziko area there was much snaring of medium game and logging. This has not been the case historically. The poachers have made it much more challenging to tackle illegal activities, as they operate at very odd hours. They no longer put permanent poacher camps for fear of the Team arresting them or destroying their hideouts. One poacher escaped leaving behind his bush meat and 33 already set snares.

The current drought in the country is only worsening the situation in Kenya's protected areas. Most of the water points have dried and this means wild elephants have to come to the stockade to get a drink. The poachers who are trailing them at night follow them to the stockade. On the 12th of July 2011 a poacher short one of the orphans which had been raised by the DSWT and released back into the wild. He shot the orphaned elephant with poisoned arrows. The poisoned arrow was still embedded in the orphans' leg by the time it was seen by Keepers on their way from cutting greens. The arrow was removed and treated. The orphan is making a good recovery.

Recent findings show that poachers are mostly targeting big game especially the elephants. It seems demand is high, and the price of ksh 10,000 per kg of ivory is too enticing, driving many people living in poverty conditions to enter the illegal poaching trade.

Following the incident of Kora (the orphaned elephant now living wild) being shot, the staff held a crisis meeting and the patrols were stepped up. The Team found six elephants at the start of the month along the river Tiva, all killed by poisoned arrows and snaring. There seems to be a repeat of the year 2002 when the situation deteriorated to very worrying levels. There is a poacher, who has previously been arrested by the Ithumba Team, who was recently released from 11 years of jail sentence for elephant poaching who is suspected to be heavily involved in these developments.

The snaring levels have steadily gone up and they are no longer being set in the usual hotspots. The Team found an elephant snare along a busy elephant trail on the edge of the Yatta towards Tiva. Bush meat was also found, being dried at poachers' camp, unfortunately the culprit managed to escape. At Wamata/ Mukuka area the Team followed 5 footprints the whole day and managed to recover 22 poisoned arrows, 5 bows and 50 kgs of unga (maize meal). The five poachers spotted the Team from afar and made a hasty retreat. All the same the Team laid ambush along the fence and arrested two poachers. One of them demonstrated to the Team how they cross the road by dragging a shrub to conceal footprints. He had 112 snares which were already set. They are also putting sacks on their feet to resemble Elephant footmarks.

#### **COMMUNITY OUTREACH**

The Team organized two school trips to the Park. Both trips were for Kone Primary School. This is a community in the Tana Delta district and is a very isolated population. A school trip to the park leaves permanent positive memories in the students' minds and may affect their choices in future when it comes to their environments. The pupils as well as their parents were very excited about the trip. The parents all came to the school grounds which is unusual for the other schools. To the community, this was a very special occasion for other duties to be abandoned
